

Welcome from our new Mayor Jenny Shattock

A week has passed very quickly since the election results became known and we have hit the ground running. Leading up to Christmas newly elected members are facing a busy time as we go into induction workshops, Council meetings, budget workshops and annual planning workshops. It is exciting times ahead and I am privileged to lead a team who want to continue to take our district forward.

I am thrilled and humbled at the support from the community at this election. I am excited to be your Mayor and to have the mandate from the district to build on the platform that has been set by our previous Council. All sitting councillors were re-elected and the voting turnout increased by 6% to 44.41% from the previous election.

The team is a mix of new and experienced which gives us a good balance and we have some excellent skills around the table. Each Ward has new members and I'm looking forward to new ideas and good debate.

I do want to acknowledge everyone who put their name forward for election to council. Congratulations to those who were successful and thank you to those who did not make it this time, but took the brave step of putting your name forward.

I want to acknowledge our previous Mayor Neil Sinclair and the work he has achieved for our district over the fifteen years he was on Council, twelve as Mayor. He has been an inspirational, innovative leader. We as a Council have achieved some significant milestones in our quest for more jobs and sustainability and I have learnt a huge amount under his guidance and support.

Going forward it was evident during the election that people wanted more opportunity for input into Council and better communication and I have taken that on board. There will be an opportunity prior to each Council meeting for half an hour, for people to speak at an open public forum. Anyone wishing to speak at that forum will need to phone Council to

book in a timeslot and I will also be re-introducing street meetings in each of our towns.

It was also evident that recognising unity across the district was important, however we do need to respect the individual identities and aspirations of each of our towns and a priority for our new Council will be supporting the projects that are underway in each community.

We have some big issues to face as a district in the near future. The impacts of the Healthy Rivers Wai Ora proposed changes to the regional plan which is out for consultation will have a significant impact on our economy and we need to be on the front foot to widen our economic base if it is adopted.

We also need to keep an eye on the proposed Local Government Amendment Act 2012 which has been deferred until March by Central

Government. If this piece of legislation goes through as it is, then local democracy will be seriously undermined, effectively it is amalgamation by stealth. We have submitted on this already, however there may be more to do.

IN brief

- A report from the South Waikato Investment Fund was tabled recently. Key updates highligted included an agreement at Trust level to merge the DRIVE trust with the SWIF Trust, employment of a full time manager, the growth in the portfolio by \$4m and details about a few small investments.
- We allocated \$47,000 out of a possible \$50,000 during the most recent grant round. No applications were declined but one was referred to the Mayoral Fund as it was under \$500.



Putāruru speaks out on concept plan

Putāruru Moving Forward (PMF) is a group of local business and community people, working alongside Pride in Putāruru to develop a vision for the future of the Putāruru area. PMF was established to develop economic and social vibrancy in Putāruru. The group is developing a draft Concept Plan which they shared with the community to get input into identifying what is great about Putāruru and what can be improved.

The survey was distributed through the Putāruru community newsletter the Prattler, online and through retail shops in Putāruru. PMF was thrilled with the 151 responses they received, and acknowledge the careful thought and consideration that went into the responses. The survey covered nine questions focusing on finding out what people believed was important for Putaruru into the future, what they currently like about Putāruru, what improvements they thought were required and how they wanted to see Putāruru in years to come.

PMF members have collated the results from the survey, developed a list of common themes and will be reporting back to the community in full in the next issue of The Prattler. Council is summarising the results here for everyone in the South Waikato.

The list of common themes in the block alongside will be used to develop the Concept Plan and an 'action plan' of what needs to be done and when.

When asked what people would like Putāruru to be world famous for, three themes came through strongly. These were 'a central place to explore the outdoors', 'an interesting place to live' and 'pristine waterways that are accessible for recreation/tourism'.

People were asked to choose six strengths and six improvement areas from a list of social attributes. Almost 80% of people who responded to the survey felt that Putāruru's central location was a key strength, followed by Te Waihou Walkway and the Blue Spring (66%). 'A place for children to grow up' and 'a place for older people to live' were important to 46% and 41% of respondents, respectively.

There was no clear front runner in terms of areas that needed improvement. 'Job opportunities' ranked the highest (56%) with 'retail shopping' (53%) second, followed by 'supermarket' and 'main street'.

Respondents were fairly consistent in terms of where they wanted to see Putāruru in five years' time, wanting Putaruru to be vibrant, offering retail shopping, with no empty shops. Other themes that came through strongly here were wanting more activities for our children and young people to do, more job opportunities, more young families settling here, a well-maintained bustling town centre and more tourist opportunities with many dining out opportunities, good retail and accommodation options.

Common Themes

- We need more things for our children and young people to do.
- More employment opportunities in our town are needed.
- We need to encourage and make it attractive for young families to settle in our towns.
- We need to create more opportunities to become a visitor destination by leveraging off Te Waihou and the Waikato River Trails.
- Our schools need to be supported by locals.
- More housing and section choices and improved housing stock are needed.
- Good quality accommodation is essential if visitors are going to stay here.
- More dining options are needed.
- Many of our shops are shut on the weekend and because of this, the town appears 'dead'.
- The artisan food and beverage theme seemed a good idea.
- We would like to see our retail shops, including the supermarket be well presented and provide a good mix of products for locals with friendly customer service.
- Appropriate facilities and services catering to the elderly are needed.
- Putāruru is a service town that strengthens our rural community.
- The benefits of our central location is maximised to encourage new commercial and logistics businesses.
- Putāruru is known as a central base to explore the great outdoors with great recreational activities.
- We should expand on our reputation for pure water.
- Visitors need to be able to access good quality information on what Putāruru has to offer.

Respondents were asked to rate the level of importance of five statements shown below with 1 being not important and 10 being very important/essential. The results from all respondents are averaged out.

Overall satisfaction with Council ranks high

In the past, Council has undertaken a Residents' Satisfaction Survey once every three years, during the development of the Long Term Plan. The survey is used to help Council improve the way it delivers its services and determine levels of service for our activities. The levels of service that we decide are then used to determine our performance measures/KPIs.

The providers of the Residents' Satisfaction Survey put a proposal to Council to change to a more regular satisfaction reporting regime called the 'Council perception monitor'. This will allow Council to regularly track our community's perception of Council. The survey that was completed in April was the first in this new regime. The second telephone survey was done in September/ October and we are likely to see the results of the second quarter survey late in October.

For some of the activities, there is a significant portion of the respondents who either didn't know about the activity, or hadn't used the service. This page shows tables with three coloums:

- 1. service or topic
- 2. satisfaction <u>EX</u>cluding the 'don't knows'

The rest of our services and activities that we surveyed were ranked greater than 70% satisfaction, which overall is a pleasing result. the results of the upcoming surveys will allow us to start identify trending problem areas and opportunities for celebration.

Who do we call?

402 telephone interviews were undertaken between April and May this year using landlines. This necessitated calling between 2,000 and 3,000 phone numbers. Approximately 400 people will be involved each survey. All participants are 'stood down' for a year after participating.

The quota we look for applies to age, demographic and ward and is weighted to account for discrepancies based on Census data; some people may be willing to be interviewed but that quota may already have been filled and the interview doesn't proceed. Elected members, staff and family are also excluded.

Resolution of service requests and complaints

The satisfaction figures of those who have lodged a service request or a complaint are pretty low. In particular, people are least satisfied with: how long it took to resolve the matter (36%) and the resolution/outcome (41%). This result is very concerning to Council and is a key focus area going forward.

Request for service of complaint

We gathered information on the number of respondents who had made a service request or a complaint to Council. We then asked what the request/complaint had been about. 21% of respondents had made a request or complaint, and 48% of those complaints related to 'other', 9% related to footpaths and 9% related to dogs. The most common complaint in the 'other' category related to trees.

Council's Annual Report 2015-16 ticked off

South Waikato District Council's external auditor Deloitte presented Council's Annual Report 2015-16 audit on Thursday. Council was provided as clean audit report with some minor improvements noted.

"It is always encouraging when Council receives a good audit report," said Audit and Risk Committee Chairperson, Glenn Snelgrove. "The audit report noted a few minor matters for attention; but overall this is a sound audit report that reflects Council's business is undertaken

appropriately. As Chair I would like to see the minor points resolved next year and a project plan put in place to streamline the process."

The then Mayor Neil Sinclair, who is standing down from Council after four terms was again pleased with the good audit report saying, "In all the years I have been Mayor, Council has always received a sound audit report. This gives us as elected members, surety of our financial state and that staff

are following the law and acting appropriately."

Ex-Mayor Sinclair paid tribute to the staff involved in producing the report.

Auditors reviewed all aspects of the Annual Report. Key areas included reviewing the revaluation of infrastructural assets, ensuring that our rates are set through sound processes and at appropriate levels, ensuring that sensitive expenditure has appropriate controls, ensuring policies and

legislative compliance, check that our delegations policy has enough detail, our purchasing systems are sound and that Council has reliable IT controls in place.

Chairperson Mr Snelgrove opened the meeting briefly to members of the public, asking for queries on the audit report that the auditors could clarify for them. It was extremely encouraging that no queries resulted.

Our journey started with the Tokoroa Concept Plan in 2008. Within this plan Council identified Leith Place as a priority.



IN brief continued

- Council was presented with two beautiful paintings by Terry Fergusson (The Bushmans Son) on long term loan. One of the paintings will be hung in the Council office and one in the events centre. Mayor Neil, on behalf of Council, was humbled by the gesture.
- The industry steering group of the Trade Training Centre along with management and tutors from Waiariki (now merged with Bay of Plenty Polytech) attended the meeting to appoint Mayor Neil Sinclair as Patron of the Trade Training Centre. Accolades for Neil's support, passion and commitment to the initiative were mentioned by the industry leaders and education sector representatives. Mayor Neil of course paid tribute to everyone involved but was honoured to have been appointed Patron.
- The Community Group will be leading the development of the entranceway into the Events Centre (where the East Bowling Club was situated). They will be looking to develop a Project Plan that will include community engagement.
- Council will be introducing a mobile phone public notification application called Antenno in the coming month to enhance community notification of events and services.
