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# You can't miss our new district and town billboards!

ver the past couple of months, residents and visitors to the South Waikato would have seen new town and district billboards installed at all district entranceways and the roads leading into our four towns Tīrau, Putāruru, Tokoroa and Arapuni. More on the project on page 4 inside.

# Route 32 is coming to you!

e've received some exciting news from our friends at Busit... a bus route to Hamilton is finally making its way to the South Waikato as of Monday 13 February!

This is an awesome option for students who want to still live at home and travel to Hamilton!

Where the bus route takes you: The bus departs from the Tokoroa Bus Hub at 7.10am, Lichfield, Putāruru, Tīrau, Cambridge, The Cambridge Velodrome, Tamahere, Waikato University and the final stop is at the Hamilton Transport Centre at 8.50am for Wintec students and any other passengers.

Fares are purchased using the Bee Card system.

The card works by tagging your card on/off at a machine to pay your fare. It automatically works out where you hop on/hop off and charges you the correct fare. Using a Bee Card is cheaper than paying cash, which is still an available option.

Bee Cards are \$5 each, and can be purchased from the Tokoroa Library or online at beecard. co.nz. Once you have created an account, you can add money and/or concessions on to the card to be debited each time you use the bus.

All under 5s travel free and do not need a Bee Card. A SuperGold Card concession is available on a registered Bee Card. This entitles the card holder to free travel on all services.

#### **BLAST FROM THE PAST**

New Zealand beats England in a cricket test for the first time on **15 February 1978**. New Zealand suffered many test defeats at the hands of England's cricketers before finally winning for the first time at Wellington's Basin Reserve in February 1978.

Needing only 137 in their second innings to win, England was dismissed for just 64. Richard Hadlee took six wickets for 26 runs and went on to become one of the world's greatest wicket-taker in tests. This first victory against England – at the 48<sup>th</sup> attempt – was enthusiastically welcomed as proof that New Zealand could at last compete with the inventors of the game.

his was the first Citizenship Ceremony that has been able to be held in a public setting since the COVID upheal on previous events.

This ceremony was also Mayor Gary's first ceremony to officiate since being sworn in as the South Waikato Mayor. Mayor Gary asked Councillors Sandra, Hans, Kerry and Bill to help him out on the stage to present the various declarations, certificates and native trees to our newest citizens.

Mayor Petley commented that welcoming our new citizens into the South Waikato - a place that they have chosen to make their home, is an honour. We welcomed ten New New Zealanders from South Africa, Philippines, Korea, England, Scotland and India. Kia Ora. Talofa Lava. Kia Orana. Welcome. We are so happy you're here!

# A PLUG FOR PLUMBOSOLVENCY

he Ministry of Heath has identified that some New Zealand waters are naturally acidic and can dissolve minute traces of metals such as lead, nickel and cadmium from plumbing materials while standing in plumbing fittings for several hours. Tests show that residents in the South Waikato District are supplied with such water. Purely as a precaution, all households are advised to flush pipes for ten seconds before using their water for drinking, food preparation or cleaning teeth. This will ensure corrosion products that may have accumulated are washed away.

#### Do residents need to be concerned? No, there are no lead fittings anywhere in the South Waikato District Council water reticulation system and there is no health risk related to this requirement. The requirement is to raise

community awareness to flush pipes.



#### We love it here!

hen South Waikato decided it needed a new campaign to attract more visitors, the first step was to ask the 25,000 people who call the district home what makes it special.

Their answer was loud and proud: "We love it here". That's now the over-arching slogan for the whole district, with catchphrases and colour themes chosen for each of the four towns of Arapuni, Tīrau, Putāruru and Tokoroa.

The new signage is all about presenting a fresh new image for South Waikato... that is positive, forward-looking, welcoming and aligned with all the exciting growth happening in the district.

The catchphrase for Tīrau, **Refresh in Tīrau** was chosen. Putāruru's slogan is **Families thrive**, **futures grow**. Tokoroa's slogans include several cultural greetings and for Arapuni, the slogan **Take it slow**, **enjoy our village** was chosen.

The colours for each town's signs were chosen to represent something special. The pink for Arapuni represents the gorgeous sunsets they get. The blue

for Putāruru represents the Blue Spring [Te Puna]. The red ochre for Tokoroa is significant to the local iwi, Raukawa. The green for Tirau represents its strong farming roots.

The new signs are all about people and community – and that's why Council asked the people of South Waikato to put their names and faces forward... and 22 locals answered the call to be the face of their town and now feature on the town entranceways.

SWDC digital marketing coordinator Michaela Coffin said the local faces would make the signs "really special".

The 16 new welcome signs spread across Tokoroa, Putāruru, Tīrau, and Arapuni complement brand new South Waikato district entry signs. The signs provide an over-arching district brand, while maintaining a focus on each town's unique identity.

South Waikato District Council's head of economic development
Paul Bowden said the sign refresh is part of a strategy to put the
district on the map and highlight how friendly and welcoming the community is to visitors,
businesses, and potential new residents.

There will also be welcome signs from local iwi Raukawa alongside each district entry sign.

The signs gained national attention as they were featured on Breakfast TV in December after the Waikato Herald earlier reported on the re-branding project being under way.

Michaela said because the four towns were "very diverse", the Council was looking for a single unifying idea that "truly reflected" the district and the towns.

Paul said Council research from 2019 had shown that many people outside the district could not place South Waikato on a map.

"Some have negative perceptions of our towns - but the locals love living here, and we needed that to shine through."

The signs are part of a wider strategy to put the district and its four main towns on the map for visitors and investors.

South Waikato District Council Mayor Gary Petley says the signs were about presenting a fresh new image for South Waikato.

"[One] that is positive, forward-looking and welcoming and is aligned with all the exciting growth happening in the district. The new signage will build pride in the district among locals so they can advocate for it, and welcome new investors, residents and visitors."

# NEW ARAPUNI BORE IS UP AND RUNNING... WITH WATER

he Arapuni bore project that started mid-last year is just about complete, with just a few tidyups to left to go. Arapuni residents' water has been processed through the new system since mid-January.

This \$600,000 project started mid-last year and encompassed drilling a new drinking water bore and installing modern support infrastructure to connect the system to the treatment facilities.

While there will be no noticeable day-to-day difference for residents, the project is part of Council's investment into water supply reliability by ensuring long-term security of supply.

Council would like to thank the neighbouring farmer for working with us on land access.

# PUTĀRURU SKATE PARK UPDATE

he Putāruru Skate Park development has been underway over the past couple of months. With landscaping complete we can look forward to seeing the park really take shape over the coming months.

During the last LTP Council proposed to either refurbish the Putāruru skate bowl only, or to refurbish the bowl and enhance the park. The bigger and better option was supported by 78% of submitters, so that's what Council decided to deliver.

The project started in November of 2022 with the team removing all

of the topsoil and laying down all of the gap metal.

In January the bulk groundworks and pre-fabrications were completed and the contractor is beginning to build the features of the Skate Park.

It is an absolute NO to leave your pets in the car whilst parked in the hot summer. Even with the windows down and the vehicle in the shade, a car can rapidly heat up - as much as 10 degrees in 10 minutes (!), putting the pet left inside at risk of heat stroke, irreparable brain damage or even death. Again, if you can't handle sitting in a parked car in the heat, neither can they!

#### **EVER STARED AT PACKAGING AND** WONDERED WHERE IT GOES?

hen it comes to recycling and rubbish, it can be difficult to decide what goes where. Does it go in the rubbish? Can it be recycled? Can it be re-used?

And perhaps the biggest questions of all... where is the recycling symbol and why is it so small!!?

Well, unfortunately Council has zero control over the size of the recycling symbol nor the placement... but we do advocate in waste circles for this to be standardised and BIGGER!

What we can help with is what goes where. Council's What Goes Where Guide to Waste provides an alphabetical listing for a wide range of household and commercial products and what to do with them. Find the product you want - and it gives you the answer! It's that simple.

The tool is based on the urban household collection system so refers to rubbish wheelie bins and recycling wheelie bins and crates or other like e-waste recycling, op shops, scrap metal dealers etc. But it's easy to interpret for our rural residents.

The function is also searchable and users can suggest additions to be included too. Visit our website and follow the WASTE GUIDE link below the space bar.

# A few reminders AUTOMATIC PAYMENTS

f you pay your rates by automatic payment (AP), you need to check that your AP covers your new rates amount. Due to the property revaluations, your rates may have changed. Please call Council on 07 885 0340 to check on this.



It is your responsibility to ensure your AP amount covers your rates by the due date.

We encourage ratepayers to move from automatic payments to direct debits to avoid a shortfall; and a possible rates penalty.

With direct debits (see below), Council deducts what is needed so that your rates are always covered. Automatic payments can sometimes not cover the amount owing per quarter because of the timing of incoming AP payments vs outgoing rates payments.

#### **DIRECT DEBITS**

ouncil has weekly, fortnightly, monthly, quarterly and annual direct debit options.

Weekly and fortnightly direct debits operate on Thursdays or Tuesdays. Direct debits

are adjusted annually by Council to ensure that the correct amount of rates is paid, removing the need for ratepayers to change their automatic payments themselves every year.

It's a really great option.

#### RATES REBATE SCHEME

he government's Rates Rebate
Scheme assists low
income home owners
to pay rates.

Applications for rates rebates can be made through Council offices in Putāruru or Tokoroa.

Applications for the 2022-23 year can be made anytime, until Friday 30 June 2023, but we encourage qualifying ratepayers to apply as soon as possible; and not leave it to the last day.

ith the school holidays over there will a lot more children travelling on our roads and footpaths to and from school. Among these will be tamariki who will going to school for the first or starting at new school.

Here are few tips to make their journey safer and to help parents/quardians:

- Walk on the footpath, close to the houses and away from the road.
- Look and listen for traffic at driveways.
- Use pedestrian crossings.
- If you normally drive your child to school, park your car further away from school and then walk some of the way, using the walk to teach your child about road safety.
- If your child is going to be cycling to school, always ensure they wear a helmet. It should be the right size, with little movement when fitted correctly, if the helmet tips sideways, backwards or forwards it is too loose.
- Check also that their bicycle is safe and everything is working the way its intended.
- If you are driving your child to school always let your children in and out of the car on the footpath side only.
- Park on the same side of the road as your destination.
- When collecting your child, meet them at the gate and walk with them to the car.
- Ensure your child is in the appropriate restraint for their size.
- If your child is travelling by bus, make sure they know to stand well back from the road when waiting for the bus.
- When picking up your tamariki or dropping them off, wait on the same side as the bus stop.

Back to school can be safe for everyone if we all remember to take extra caution!



# **Council ticks** off on LTP **Amendment**



n Tuesday 13 December, Council resolved an amendment to the Long Term Plan (LTP) 2021-31.

It is planned to deliver several significant infrastructure projects to support growth in the South Waikato for our communities' current and future needs.

The projects, branded Building BIG **Empowering GROWTH** lie in the three waters areas across the district.

Through its LTP and Annual Plans, Council has confirmed with our community that economic growth and resilience is a priority.

"Economic growth has gained momentum in recent years. Our community is starting to flourish as we benefit from economic opportunities," said Mayor Petley.

"If we choose not to invest at scale and at pace, there is a risk we will miss out on economic growth and employment opportunities for our people."

Modelling work over the past years has enabled Council to identify the infrastructure improvement projects we need to deliver to take advantage of growth.

Currently we are constrained in what we can offer businesses because we don't have adequate supporting infrastructure.

"These projects will allow us to unlock land to prepare for housing and business growth throughout the district," said Susan Law, Council's Chief Executive.

"We will prepare a change to the district plan so there can be residential, industrial and business development in Tokoroa, Putāruru and Tīrau."

The projects will be loan funded to minimise rate impact.

Council's proposal was out for public consultation during October and November, with hearings in early December.

"We're grabbing the future with both hands so that we can lead growth in the district," said Mayor Petley.
